



## Notice to the Brethren - Proposal to Go Dark

A request has been made by a Brother of PVST #29 to explore the potential for the lodge to go dark during the summer months. It has been expressed by this brother that the summer months tend to be very slow for our lodge as many of our brethren are taking vacations to be with their families and to escape the rising temperatures in The Phoenix area. The suggestion is that we could go dark in July and August, the warmest months of the summer.

A review of the option has determined that going dark is an option available to our lodge, but there are a number of things that must be done in order to do so.

The 2024 Constitutions and Statutes for the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Free & Accepted Masons of Arizona specifically states in Section 6, subsection 2.2.1 Meetings:

"Each Lodge shall have not more than one stated meeting in each calendar month, but may hold such other meetings as it may determine or the Master shall direct. When the By-laws of the Lodge refer specifically to the Lunar Month, they shall schedule their Stated Meetings consistent with their approved By-laws. Each Lodge shall have not less than ten stated meetings in each calendar year and the month or months in which the Lodge is to be "dark" are to be specifically stated in the by-laws. In case of a city, county, state or national emergency where the impact limits meetings, the Grand Master shall have the power to grant relief from the 10 stated meetings in a calendar year requirement.

However, the Grand Master may issue a dispensation to a Lodge to hold two (2) stated meetings in any Grand Lodge Year at a time and/or on a date different from that specified in the Lodge bylaws, provided that all members of the Lodge are given 60 days written notice via first class mail of the changed time(s) and/or date(s)."

This section specifically calls out that the lodge bylaws Must specifically state what month or months (no more than 2) are to be designated as the dark months (no stated meeting).

This leads to the required steps for our lodge to go dark. We would have to vote to amend our bylaws to reflect the change. Specifically, Article IV, Meetings, Section 1. Occurrence, which states:

"a. Paradise Valley Silver Trowel Lodge No. 29 stated meetings will be held at 7:30 pm on the first Wednesday of each calendar month at the Lodge building. If this date is on a legal holiday as defined in General Regulation 33 of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge F&AM of Arizona, the stated meeting will be held on the next following Wednesday. Legal holidays as defined in Regulation 33 are as follows and subject to amendment by the Grand Lodge: New Years Day, Presidents Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Armed Forces Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day, and the day prior to the opening of and during the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge."

This section would have to be amended to show the specific month or months that the Lodge would be dark. To do so, the proposed amendment to the bylaws must be submitted in writing and read in a stated meeting. Following that stated meeting, the proposed amendment must be communicated to the brethren in the next trestle board. The proposed amendment must be voted on in the following stated meeting

and be passed by a 2/3 majority vote of those brothers present. The approved amendment must then be submitted to and approved by the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Free & Accepted Masons of Arizona or the Grand Master of Free & Accepted Masons in Arizona in writing. After receipt of that approval, the amendment can be put into effect. This process is outlined in Part VI, Amendments, sections 1 through 4 of the bylaws.

With all of this in mind, it has been proposed to bring this matter before the Brethren at the April Stated Meeting for discussion. If the decision is to proceed with this effort, a draft proposal will be created and submitted for reading at the May stated meeting with notice of the same in the trestle board to follow. The proposed amendment would then be eligible for vote by the brethren in June. If the vote is successful, the formal proposed bylaws amendment would then be submitted to Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Free & Accepted Masons of Arizona for final approval.

## **Key Dates & Proposed Timeline:**

- April Stated Meeting: Initial discussion of the proposal with the Brethren and decision to proceed or not. (Decision made to proceed)
- May Stated Meeting: Formal reading of the draft bylaw amendment; notice to follow in the trestle board. (Draft shown below, to be read in May SM)
- June Stated Meeting: Vote on the proposed amendment (requires 2/3 majority).
- **Post-June**: If passed, the amendment will be submitted to the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of F&AM of Arizona or the Grand Master for final approval.
- If approved: The Lodge may officially go dark in July and August

#### ARTICLE IV, MEETINGS

#### SECTION 1. OCCURRENCE

- a. Except as stated in subsection (b). Paradise Valley Silver Trowel Lodge No. 29 stated meetings will be held at 7:30 p.m. on the first Wednesday of each calendar month at the Lodge building. If this date falls on a legal holiday as defined in General Regulation 33 of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge F&AM of Arizona, the stated meeting will be held on the next following Wednesday. Legal holidays as defined in Regulation 33 are as follows and subject to amendment by the Grand Lodge: New Years Day, Presidents Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Armed Forces Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day, and the day prior to the opening of and during the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge.
- a-b. Paradise Valley Sivler Trowel Lodge No. 29 will go dark as defined and permitted in the constitution, bylaws, and general regulations of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge F&AM of Arizona for the calendar months of July and August.
- b.c. The Lodge building is located in Phoenix, Arizona.
- e.d. The Master of the Lodge may call special meetings for degree work or other Masonic activities.
